



2016 GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT TRAINING COURSES



Gender Fair Education JUNE 6-10

GFE is an intensive one-week course designed for development workers and educators in formal and non-formal education settings (i.e. teachers, administrators, module writers, trainers, etc). The course introduces the human rights and gender based perspectives in schools and other teaching, and learning environment. Topics include education as human rights; gender fair language; gender mainstreaming in the curriculum and implementation of CHED Memo in the school system.



Seminar on Migration, Trafficking, Refugee, and Asylum Issues JUNE 13-17

SMTRAI provides a critical overview of the processes, dynamics and challenges of migration in the context of a globalized world. The seminar will discuss a broad range of issues relative to migration, including migration and human rights; social costs of migration; comparative policies of migration; and forced migration in the context of political and environmental crises. Trafficking, refugee and asylum issues will also be included, especially in the context of the migration refugee crisis in Europe and Asia. The course utilizes interactive and case study approaches in understanding the complex dimensions of migration, trafficking and refugee movements.



Gender Responsive Planning and Budgeting JUNE 20-23

The gender and development (GAD) budgeting process secures financial support for activities promoting gender equality and women's empowerment. Financial support, while necessary, must be complemented by strengthened organizational capacity for successful planning and implementation. This course will introduce the theories and practice of GAD budgeting in the Philippines. In line with PCW-NEDA-DBM Joint Circular No. 2012-01 on GAD Plans and Budgets and Accomplishments to implement Magna Carta of Women. The approach will use case studies and sharing of participants' experiences to enhance learning.



International Women's Human Rights and Governance JULY 18-22

Running on its 18th year, IWHR&G is an academic-based women's human rights course offered in the Philippines. The program discusses the use of international human rights instruments from gender and rights perspectives in analyzing complex issues of discrimination, inequality and oppression brought about by the intersecting and intertwining factors of class, gender, ethnicity, age, sexual orientation and others.



ASEAN 101 JULY 25-28

This training course will discuss key issues in the three pillars of ASEAN – political, economic, and socio cultural. Using a gender lens perspective, the training will cover among others the progress in the promotion and implementation of human rights and gender equality programs; the opportunities and challenges of regional, economic, and financial integration including issues on trade and investment, education, connectivity, and migration. It will also look into the challenges and barriers towards ASEAN economic integration, with particular focus on its impact on women.
